

Take Advantage of Other Libraries Services for Graduate Students

Interlibrary Loan (ILL)

The Interlibrary Loan Team, as part of the Access Services Department, provides the university community with information resources not owned by CU-Boulder. In most instances there is no charge for this service. To order books, start with the Prospector link on Chinook screens. If the book you need is not available on Prospector, use the ILLiad request form for traditional ILL. To order journal articles, first check CU-Boulder's holdings in Chinook. If you do not find the journal listed in Chinook, use the Find it at CU Article Finder form. If the article is in CU-Boulder's online holdings, you will be provided a link to the full text right away. If the article is not found in our holdings, a link to ArticleReach Direct will be provided. Click this link to submit a request to other libraries with which we have resource sharing agreements. If the article is found you will receive an e-mail with a link to the electronic article. If the article is not found in ArticleReach Direct, your request will be automatically converted to a traditional ILL request in ILLiad.

Purchase Requests, Library Instruction for Classes, Research Consultations

Bibliographers are responsible for the selection of books and journals in a subject area. They welcome your purchase suggestions, provide bibliographic instruction to undergraduate and graduate classes, and are also available for individual consultations on research projects.

Proxy Cards

CU-Boulder faculty may authorize a representative to check out materials on their account. A proxy card will be issued upon presentation of a signed letter on letterhead that states the representative's name and ID number and the professor's name and ID number. Proxy cards are valid for one semester and may be renewed at the written request of the faculty member. The authorizing faculty member assumes full responsibility for any library transaction made by the proxy in her or his name, including any penalties earned for failure to return recalled books, lost or damaged materials, etc.

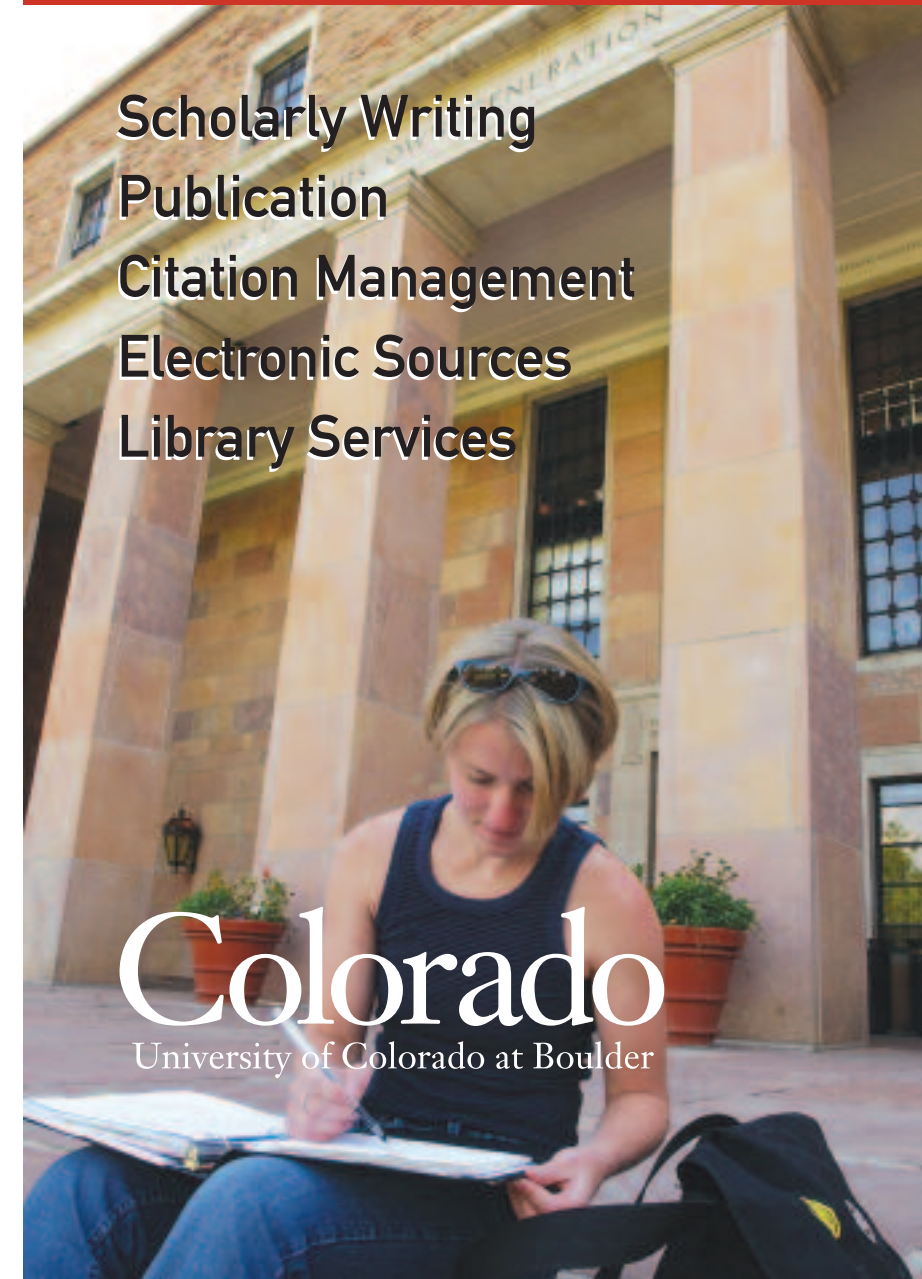

Units include laying the groundwork, manuscript preparation and submission, the editorial process, and creating a publishing plan. Get 10 Percent Off Author Publication Fees in Public Library of Science

Public Library of Science (PLOS)

University of Colorado authors now receive 10 percent off publication fees with the Public Library of Science (PLOS), a major open access publisher. The libraries of the University of Colorado campuses are sponsoring this discount with their recent purchase of a PLOS Supporting Level Membership.

PLOS publishes peer-reviewed scientific and medical journals that include original research. All PLOS articles are immediately freely accessible online and are deposited in the free public archive PubMed Central. In addition to the 10 percent discount, CU authors retain copyright ownership of their publications; articles submitted for publication receive rapid peer review and immediate publication; open access articles are disseminated faster and more widely than commercially published publications and have greater potential for being cited sooner and more frequently than commercially published publications; and articles published in PLOS journals are indexed in PubMed and permanently archived in PubMed Central.

The CU libraries feel it is imperative to support open access initiatives like PLOS that further the goal of making the world's scientific and medical literature a freely available public resource. We hope you will take advantage of this membership.



Organize, Store, and Share Your Research Citations

RefWorks, a Web-based Citation Management Tool

RefWorks enables users to create personal databases to organize, store, and share their collected citations. You can easily import references to your personal database from online databases or text files, then use RefWorks to automatically create bibliographies (or quickly format papers) based on hundreds of available citation styles. You can access your RefWorks database from any computer with an Internet connection. RefWorks is provided to the CU community (students, staff, and faculty) by University Libraries.

EEBO and ECCO

We also provide access to two major digitized collections of primary sources—Early English Books Online (EEBO) and Eighteenth Century Collections Online (ECCO).

EEBO now contains about 100,000 of over 125,000 titles listed in Pollard & Redgrave's *Short-Title Catalogue* (1475–1640) and Wing's *Short-Title Catalogue* (1641–1700) and their revised editions, as well as the Thomason Tracts (1640–1661) collection and the Early English Books Tract Supplement. The overall source

dates for these materials are 1473–1700, including the writings of Spenser, Bacon, More, Erasmus, Shakespeare, Boyle, Newton, and Galileo and providing unique windows into the landscape of English history during these periods.

ECCO is the comprehensive digital edition of *The Eighteenth Century*, the world's largest library of the printed book on microfilm. When complete, ECCO will allow full-text searching of 26 million pages of material. The collection is based on *The English Short Title Catalogue* (ESTC), a machine-readable union list of the holdings of the British Library. It includes titles from more than 1,500 university, private, and public libraries worldwide, providing a diverse collection of material for the researcher of the eighteenth century—from significant collections of women writers of the eighteenth century to multiple editions to enable scholars to make textual comparisons of the works.

From the Find Articles & More page on the University Libraries website or the Chinook online catalog, you can find links to research databases, full-text online journals, periodical indexes and abstracts, digital collections, directories, encyclopedias, dictionaries, and other reference works, arranged alphabetically and by subject area. You may access these online resources off campus from outside the Libraries; however, you must be authenticated as a CU-Boulder student, faculty, or staff member.
